Looking for something to do on your free night at Ignite? We got you covered!

## FOR THE MUSIC LOVER

**Ryman Auditorium** – The historic concert hall features all genres and styles of performance. The State, an MTV sketch comedy, has a live show at 7 pm on the free night.

<u>General Jackson Showboat</u> – The famous steamboat offers a dinner cruise with a toe-tapping show. The April 15th theme is Music City Nights which celebrates country music through the ages.

<u>Bluebird Café</u> – An intimate songwriter space, on Monday night the café holds an open mic at 6 pm followed by a band at 9 pm. First come, first served seating.



Old Town Trolley Tours – The Soul of Music City Tour shows you some of Nashville's major sights while entertaining you with stories about the city's past. The evening 7 pm tour is perfect for your free night.

<u>Printer's Alley</u> – Printer's Alley was once home to a thriving publishing industry. Today, it's a bustling area for hotels, bars, restaurants, and entertainment.

<u>Johnny Cash Museum</u> – The museum honors the life and music of the Man in Black. You can also visit the <u>Patsy Cline Museum</u> located on the next floor. Both museums are open until 7 pm.

# FOR THE FOOD LOVER

<u>Hattie B's Hot Chicken</u> – There might be a line up for this popular restaurant which is considered "the gateway hot chicken for the masses" by The Tennessean.

<u>Elliston Place Soda Shop</u> – One part soda shop, one part meat-and-three, this 83-year-old establishment leans into the old-time recipes that made it famous.

<u>Peg Leg Porker</u> – This award-winning Tennessee BBQ house and catering company is family-owned and operated. They smoke daily and even have a champion bourbon whiskey to try.













#### FOR THE BAR HOPPER

<u>The Station Inn</u> – For 40 years, this family-friendly establishment is home to live bluegrass, roots, and Americana music. You never know who might show up for a bluegrass jam, but it'll be a night to remember.

<u>Honkytonk Highway</u> – Lower Broadway is Nashville's most famous street for its live music and party atmosphere. From 10 am to 3 am, experience honky tonk's Nashville legacy.

<u>Batters Box</u> – If the venue suggestions above are too rich for your taste, you could head over to this tried-and-true dive bar not far from the action on Broadway.

## FOR THE SPORTS LOVER

<u>Bar Crawl Golf Game</u> — What do you get when you combine a mobile putt-putt course and five of the hottest Nashville bars? It's bar hopping meets the most fun miniputt game you'll ever play!

<u>Dawg House Saloon</u> – For those who enjoy watching the game while having a few drinks, this might be your home away from home. Warning: You may run into some Crimson Tide supporters here.

<u>Pins Mechanical Co.</u> – Play games like duck pin bowling, bocce, foosball, pong, and hookie while enjoying libations from the bar. There's also retro pinball and arcade games. Open until 11:30 pm on your free night. **FOR THE OUTDOOR LOVER** 

<u>John Seigenthaler Pedestrian Bridge</u> – Connecting downtown Nashville to the suburbs of East Nashville, this pedestrian and bike-only bridge has incredible views of the river and downtown skyline.

<u>Cumberland Park</u> – The riverfront park features an amphitheater, a playground, walking trails, and places to sit and take in Nashville. Open until 11 pm.

<u>Bicentennial Capitol Mall</u> – Sights in this 11-acre park includes a 200-foot granite map, a World War II Memorial, a 95-Bell Carillon, a Pathway of History, and the Rivers of Tennessee Fountains. You can visit the park until 10 pm on your free night.
